

Skirt Savvy - A Quick-to-Sew Style Choice for Spring


Want a surefire, speedy wardrobe update for spring/summer? Sew a skirt! Compared to pants, skirt are quicker to sew, far easier to fit, cooler to wear and suddenly much more stylish too.

Choose a style based on your body type:

Classic hourglass shapes look great in slim styles, dart-fitted to the waistline. Triangles – lower body dominant bodies – are also better in slim styles that don't add unwanted bulk. Plan on taking in the waistline to accommodate your higher hip:waist ratio. Rectangles – figures with little waistline definition – will find the easiest fit in patterns with a drawstring, elastic finish or facing instead of a traditional waistband. Slender rectangles appear to have more curves wearing a skirt with a skimming fit and flippy lower fullness. Inverted triangles – with dominant shoulders/bust and slim hips/thighs – can balance their figures with

slightly fuller skirts. The supposed flattery of A-line skirts is widely overstated, as the diagrams below illustrate. See how line A appears longer than Line B? And Y appears longer than X?

Layer those shapes onto a body and see how the converging side seams in Fig B/D (representing a slight taper) slim and lengthen the silhouette, while the diverging side seams in Fig A /C(representing an A-line) make the figure appear shorter and wider. Unless you have super-model shoulders to balance the fullness below, steer away from flared or A-line skirt shapes. Most slim skirt patterns have side seams that follow the straight fabric grain. Ramp up the figure flattery by drawing in a new side team, tapering from just below the fullest point of your hips to the lower edge, taking off at least ³/₄" and remembering to angle the seam back outward at the hem. Or cut the garment from



the original pattern and pin-fit the new tapered shape before trimming away excess fabric. Narrow skirts obviously require some accommodation for your stride – a slit, kick pleat or center back godet detail. One unique solution: a separating jacket zipper that opens from the top to get into the garment, and from the bottom to create variable degrees of walking room. Or accomplish the same goal more inconspicuously with an invisible zipper at the bottom of the back seam. [Speaking of zippers: placing your regular zipper at center back – even if you have to create a seam to accommodate it – sidesteps the challenges of a smooth insertion in a curved hipline area.] Of course fabrics with a soft hand and gentle drape can be sewn into fuller styles and still create a narrow silhouette. The soft folds of fabric create a series of vertical lines that slim and elongate the body. The soft drape of bias-cut fabric can soften the angularity of a rectangular figure, but may hug too closely and accentuate the fuller hips of a triangle shape.

Body type also influences color choice, since lighter, brighter or warmer colors make your lower body appear larger, while darker, cooler and more muted colors minimize. Solid fabrics are an obvious choice, providing wardrobe versatility and emphasizing interesting design details like creative seaming and pocket treatments. When choosing plaids for skirts, make sure the dominant stripes run up and down the body, not across. And plan your layout so a significant horizontal stripe falls at the hemline to anchor the entire look. Sophisticated prints can also make beautiful skirts – florals are a huge trend for spring – especially in soft, drapable fabrics. Even large motifs can be figure flattering if they aren't spaces too far apart on the background. And the soft folds of a fuller skirt break up the print and keep the eye from jumping from flower to flower across your backside. Skirts are an obvious way to spotlight beautiful border-print fabrics, but beware of placing a border at the hemline where it pulls focus down and moves attention side-to-side – both pounds-on effects. Instead, place the border along the edge of a front-wrap panel. Or position a narrow border edge-to-edge at a center front seam (even if you have to create a seamline where the original pattern was cut on a fold).

The right hemline can make or break a skirt's flattery. Rule # 1: be sure that the garment, on your body, appears longer than it is wide. Therefore the fuller the skirt is (or the fuller you are) the longer the skirt must be to maintain visual balance. For those over 30, just above the knee is probably the shortest length worth considering. Long enough to cast a shadow just below the knee is flattering to nearly every leg. Mid-calf lengths can look clunky, but the spot where you calf starts to narrow toward the ankle is another flattering option. And irregular hemlines – asymmetrical, handkerchief, diagonal – make both your body and your legs look longer for an elongating effect. You can create the slimming illusion of a longer torso by keeping skirt waistbands narrow. Or eliminate the waistband entirely by stabilizing the waistline to size with ¼" stay tape and enclosing the raw edge with a narrow self-fabric binding.

2010 National Community Service Project

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
U.S. Troops Drawstring Bag




