HIGHLIGHTS FROM KERRY'S ASG CONFERENCE CLASSES

The Hilton Americas Hotel in downtown Houston was the destination of this years' conference. It was a great facility, with easy to reach seminar rooms, great meals and quiet sleeping rooms. Once again to defray expenses I shared a room with Rita Riskedahl from the Central Iowa chapter. We met three years ago in Atlanta as Chapter President representatives needing a roommate and became fast friends. I think it was extremely hot outside, but honestly with all the fabric, notions, patterns and ideas, I saw no reason to go OUT!

My first class was on "Line and Design' where LoriAnne Reeve talked about how to adjust patterns to fit. She talked about patterns being one dimension, where our bodies are so many different sizes, shapes and dimensions, that fit and drape need to come from the 'largest' part of your body- then you adjust accordingly, taking in, rather than trying to let things out because that affects the way a garment hangs.

Next was Sewing Crinkles and Gauzes with Linda Lee. She talked about using a smaller needle and using polyester thread because it has a slight stretch and will keep seams from popping. Important to cut things out in a single layer as the fabric slips, slides, and may even have better luck cutting with a rotary cutter.

On Friday afternoon was Jackets from One Pattern with Rae Cumbie. This was the Fit for Art pattern I purchased and had custom fitted to me. It's a zip to sew up and she had about 40 jackets that were all made from the same mas-

ter pattern fitted to her. The jackets could get through every season due to different fabrics, sleeve variation. I am hoping to make a jacket a month! We'll see!!

Friday night was the style show. My friend Rita and I modeled two garments we had made. Peggy Sagers did an outstanding job of narrating about 140 models in garments that ranged from traditional to trendy, sophisticated to OUT THERE. Rita and I had purchased the same fabrics on the fabric tour last year in LA. We made two completely different garments to show how fabric is just a pallet for design and how you can sew it up in a variety of ways.

It was great fun to hear all the comments and compliments on what different things we had done with the fabric.



On Saturday, I took the Rags to Bags

class taught by Barb Callahan. It was teaching you to repurpose garments by using cut up sweaters, knit shirts and neckties to make a trendy shoulder bag. Although I wasn't wild about my color combinations, the technique to make it on the serger by serging the seams to

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the outside was different and really got you out of your comfort zone.

Next class was on Designer T-shirt necklines taught by t-shirt guru Emma Seabrooke. She walked around the room looking at each of us and told us what size pattern to draft to make the shirt to fit. She stated that most all American women are either a 10, 12, or 14 at the shoulder- it's just the rest of us that are such different sizes. T-shirts should fit at the shoulders, but



many of us buy to fit the bust or the mid-section and then they are too big across the neckline.

On Sunday, my first class was the Silk Dupioni Table runner by Katrina Walker. She has a great speedy way of making flat fell seams and I'll be sharing that one with you in the future. Clover has a fabric folding pen available that allows you to mark your fabric and fold it. It will temporarily hold until you can get to the iron to press it in place. Pretty cool little gadget!

My last class was on Sewing with Silk with Kandi Christian. She said you should not sew silk with silk thread for a garment. It is too strong and will tear the fabric. Sew with poly thread so those stitches will have some give. Also, if you plan to wash the garment, BE SURE to wash the silk before making it up. I did buy a gorgeous piece of Burma Silk from a vendor, so I am excited about getting to that garment in the coming month or two. If you are sewing with silk, to MAKE SURE you sew with a new needle 70/10.

I was guite conservative this year and did not have to ship anything home. However, I still have enough fabric from last year's haul that I just need to sit and sew for several weekends to get my wardrobe updated. My wish is for each of you to plan to attend a National Convention. This was my 5th and they are so inspirational. You not only meet new people, but you are surrounded by 700 people who are as passionate about advancing the art of sewing as you would ever meet. You notice is did not say ladies, because there were more men at this conference. I sat by a gentleman in the leadership meeting from the Olympia, Washington chapter. He is President of their chapter and has been guite involved over the years in costumes and he and his wife make corsets. He said that he had sewn garments for many years and now long arm quilts.

Next years' conference will be in Washington, DC August 2-4, 2013.

Community Service Project Update

The chapters across the country rose to the cause and made over 8,357 blankets and donated to local charities this past year.

The Bethel Foundation is our charity of choice in Oklahoma City and as the cooler weather approaches, the need is still great. Continue to make blankets for them and Jacquelyn Powell will make sure they are delivered to the site. Although their focus is on helping mothers with newborns, many of the single mothers also have other children, so blankets for all ages are used.

The blankets are designed to be 45" square and from any fabric as long as it is washable. Single thickness hemmed for warmer weather, but if you have some fleece, or heaver flannels for the cooler weather, that is fine too. They were not asking for quilts, but for blankets. Bring any finished blankets to the next meeting and Jacquelyn Powell will make sure they get to the Bethel Foundation. Make sure to keep track of your hours as we report that to the National HQ.

THE POWER OF TEN

The "Power of 10" in quilting is not some higher mathematical formula that quilters all need to learn to make a quilt. It is a simple way to complete those projects we want to finish before we buy anymore fabric.

First, simply find the projects that you are no longer interested in completing and pass them on to someone who would love it as much as you once did. Second, list "10" projects that you would like to complete. Now remember "Only 10" projects are to be on the list.

Third, begin working on the projects on the list and spend three hours toward completing it.

Fourth, keep a list of projects and the hours worked.

Fifth, once three hours are spent on a project move to the next. A quilter's interest wanes and is usually spent after three hours. Now if a project requires two to four hours it doesn't matter. Simply finish the project. Feel good about finishing it.

Sixth, find another project and add it to the list. Remember, only Ten Projects are your focus.

Seventh, continue to rotate the projects you are working on.

Eighth step is to list the supplies needed to finish your projects.

Ninth would be to shop at Texas Quiltworks (or your local quilt shop) for items to finish your projects. Local quilt shops need your support more than ever in today's economy.

...and Tenth, the 'Power of Ten' becomes reality when you are able to share your project. Be sure to share your quilt at guild meetings, quilt shops, family and friends. Remember by showing your finished project you are inspiring someone else to finish a project.

We will continue our monthly meetings at St. John's for 2013. Please remember they have a ministry through their food pantry. Non-perishable items are needed to fill pantry. Please remember your donations! Drop them off in the large boxes in the hallway on your way into the meeting.
